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Foreword

Haiku, the lovely and compact Japanese poetic form that has made its way around the globe into many languages and cultures, is now gracing the streets and green spaces of the City of Alexandria, Virginia. The evocative, few words in a haiku try to capture our experience of natural phenomena as well as of everyday occurrences. It is a joy to read, write, and share haiku in our city.

Funding from the City of Alexandria's Office of the Arts Business and Arts Collaborative Grant enabled a longstanding institution in the city, River's Edge Yoga, to work in concert with me, as the poet laureate of Alexandria, to create a community Haiku Project in 2023. I conceived this idea in order to involve community members in the reading and writing of poetry. I also wanted to offer everyone the opportunity to learn about haiku, enjoy its presence in many parts of Alexandria, and appreciate it as a reflection of our natural environment. The project has consisted of a workshop, a contest for adults and students in grades 1-12, contest-winning haiku displayed on placards in different parts of the city, and an event to celebrate the writers and winners. Finally, as the capstone to our activities, we have published "Our Natural World: 25 Haiku for Alexandria" to honor our haiku writers. This booklet also allows us to reach an even wider audience and serves as a memento of our Haiku Project.

This booklet features the haiku of the 12 contest-winning poets, selected by three judges external to the project. The theme was "Our Natural World." Congratulations to these accomplished prizewinners! Also included are an additional 13 haiku by other contest entrants, which I chose with the aim of adding more talented voices to our publication. The submissions were from the Washington, DC metropolitan area—Virginia, Maryland, and the District of Columbia; indeed, we were pleased to engage poets in our local community as well as those in nearby jurisdictions. This booklet is a tangible and delightful result of our collective creative efforts.


